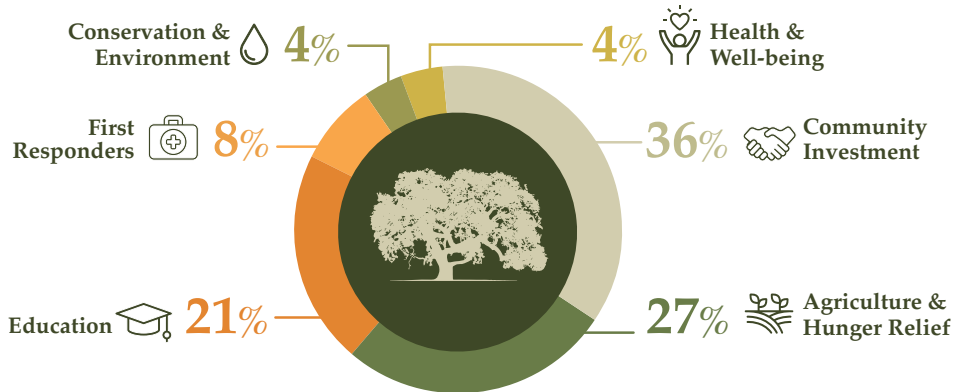

Our work in the community and commitment to the environment align well with our core value of doing the right things for the right reasons while never losing sight of our long-term focus on safety.

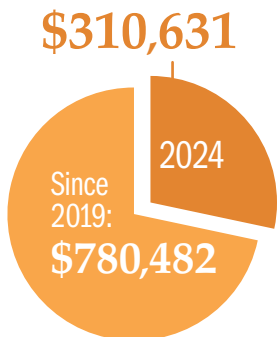

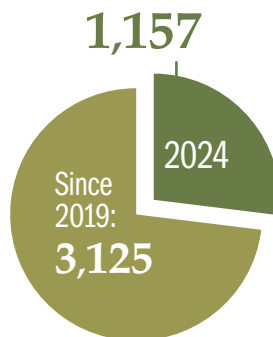
### 2024 Charitable Giving



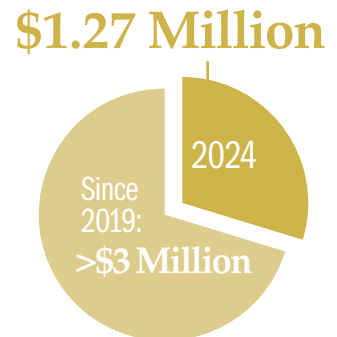
### Jr. Livestock Fair Contributions

Encino Energy’s Community Partnership Program, the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy Foundation and Surgent Construction made donations to support the Antrim Volunteer Fire Department in its commitment to protecting the residents of Guernsey and surrounding counties.

**The companies’ donations, including a public grant, totaled more than \$100,000. These donations show what can be achieved when community partners work together on a common goal.**

The Antrim Volunteer Fire Department consists of volunteers who perform fire suppression and other related emergency services in and around Guernsey County. Without a facility close by, the volunteer fire department must incur costs and travel to receive training and certifications. The new training facility and props will be used to simulate combating fires and other related scenarios, which will help serve the public.

The Antrim Volunteer Fire Department’s new training facility will be similar to the Wintersville Volunteer Fire Department’s training facility, which has provided over 1,000 training and certifications in approximately 30 months in Jefferson County. The fire department leadership and county officials have been working diligently to secure this facility for years, and the groundbreaking is a result of their successful advocacy efforts.

“This project is personal to us because we have landowners, employees and contractors who work here, and we need to make sure our local volunteer fire departments have the support they need,” said Hardy Murchison, president and CEO of Encino Energy. “We are also excited to join our partners at the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy Foundation, Guernsey County Commissioners and Surgent Construction in bringing to life another long-term health- and safety-focused project.”

## 2024 ENCINO ENERGY ANNUAL CHARITY CLASSIC

**Encino Energy, Ohio’s No. 1 oil producer and one of the state’s leading natural gas producers, and its vendors recently announced more than \$105,000 in donations from the 2024 Encino Vendor Charity Classic.** The event was created in 2023 to give thanks to vendors and contractors who work with Encino Energy and are a major part of the company’s success.

The 2024 gathering was a two-day event consisting of a clay shoot, golf outing and awards reception. Vendors came together to sponsor the event at various levels, and proceeds went directly to local nonprofits that impact Encino’s operational area. \$100,000 in donations was split evenly between five nonprofit organizations, including The Brightside Project, the Youngstown Warren Regional Chamber Foundation, Foundation for Appalachian Ohio, the Cambridge-Guernsey County Community Improvement Corporation (CIC) and the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy Foundation (MWCF). Each nonprofit organization received a donation of \$20,000.



Donations raised from the course also included \$5,000 to the Ohio Natural Energy Foundation. This year’s presenting sponsors were Evolution WellServices, Patterson UTI, Tetra Technologies and Vallourec.
